Join us from 2pm – 5pm for a preview of the exhibit, music, and light refreshments.


GHP is hosting an opening reception for our latest exhibit: *The Eckstein School which will* run from February 17, 2011 until May 21, 2011.

With the help of former pupils of the Eckstein School we have produced a wonderful new exhibit celebrating the Eckstein School and its influence on the lives of the pupils who attended there.

This exciting exhibit offers a glimpse into the lives of the students who attended the Eckstein School, their teachers, parents, and the community they grew up in. Using photographs and artifacts we chronicle the history of the School from its opening in 1915 until segregation ended in 1958.

Also included in the exhibit are a small collection of sporting trophies won by Eckstein School, Eckstein PTA minute books, a scrapbook of articles about the school and its students written for the Glendale Monitor, and a brief history of Miss Eleanor Eckstein after whom the school was named.

Glendale Meteorite – Follow Up

In our last issue we were asking for information about the HWN "meteorite." It had been identified by Bob Galbraith as an FRDK (funny rock, don't know) but that was all.

Then Jack Cook called with information on it. It seems that when Mr. Mathew Addy Greene (1901 -1967) bought the petrified log out west a long time ago, he also was sold the "meteorite". Mr. Greene dedicated the log to the solidarity of Glendale and it was placed in front of town hall. The "meteorite" was placed near the drive at the Harry Whiting Brown Community Center.

Mr. Cook read that meteorites could be very valuable so he took it upon himself to send a small sample for testing. When it came back several weeks later the assay confirmed that it was no more than a chunk of slag, probably from a steel mill. No wonder the rock now resides near the back basement door.

In the final analysis it looks like Mr. Greene was scammed.
